- A very important point has been brought forward by our CCE-MC staff -- that being that they are not getting effective input, from the board and our committees, assisting them in putting forth the best programing possible. The changes to be implemented, in the committee structure/function, are meant to address this. Word back to staff: We hear you, and are excited to improve!

- Discussion followed:

~ Concern that our individual committees, currently, may not recognize that they are a part of 'the whole', connecting to other programs. (new format looks to address this) ~ Concern was raised about potentially asking too much from our volunteer committee members.

- This could be addressed by holding a couple of meetings involving most of the related committees, then breaking up to work on separate focus' - then coming back together to interconnect, as needed.
